2. <u>Resolutions for the 230th Session of St. George's Vestry</u> <u>Sunday February 13, 2022</u>

- 1. Be it resolved that Linda Telega be appointed Vestry Clerk for this meeting.
- 2. Be it resolved that the Vestry of St George's accept the proposed budget for 2022.
- 3. That Lori Martin be elected Peoples' Warden and Paul Chapman be elected Deputy Peoples' Warden for a one -year term.
- 4. Be it resolved that the Reports presented to this Vestry be adopted as written or amended.
- 5 (a). Be it resolved that this Vestry record with gratitude the efforts of the many members of this congregation who work diligently in providing leadership and service in the many areas of parish life and worship.
- 5 (b). Be it resolved that this Vestry expresses its collective gratitude to Scott McLeod for his 7 years of ministry at St. George's and express its best wishes to Scott, Su, Theo and Averie for their new life in Kitchener-Waterloo.

Dear Friends,



I have been thinking back. Almost two years ago, we gathered in our packed gym on a Friday night to express our gratitude to the Reverend Michael Mondloch for his ministry among us as he began his next chapter in church leadership. We breathed each other's air and smudged our germs all over plates, glasses, and smooth surfaces with abandon. I had just that morning cancelled a trip overseas because of the threat that COVID was becoming, but I didn't understand the kind of shut-down to regular life that was around the corner. We certainly had no idea that this would be the last St. George's gathering for the foreseeable

future, that so much of the in-person communal expressions of our prayer and fellowship were about to be so dramatically interrupted.

Now, almost two years later, we have had another significant farewell. Our church has been so tremendously blessed by the ministry of the Reverend Scott McLeod—by his faithfulness, integrity, hard work, exceptional skill set, and great loving care for our church—and yet, as the pandemic rages on, we will wait and hope for the time when we can be crowded together again to tell him, in person, how much he and his ministry has meant to us.

We have spent the past two years worshipping mostly online, with only sporadic opportunities to re-open our sanctuary. We have continued fellowship and Christian learning and prayer practices over Zoom. We have adjusted our primary ministries to our community—our daily breakfast and feeding programs, our STEP Centre—to be able to continue to safely show up and offer this critical help to those struggling the most. We have watched significant milestones come and go. We have honoured those who have died as best as we can. We have faced the crushing disappointment of having Christmas services moved online at the last minute--not one year, but two years in a row. We have pivoted and pivoted again.

We have weathered COVID better than most churches. God has blessed us with the financial resources we have needed and, most importantly, with the creative dedication of our people to be able to adjust and pivot for the sake of continuing together in prayer and service. None of this has been easy, and yet my heart is so full of gratitude for you, for God working in you, and for how great things have happened in this church during such a fraught time.

Our task now is to look forward. It's hard to do that when we are still processing so much of what we have been through, what has been lost. It's also hard to do when we don't know what is happening with this pandemic or what end might be in sight. It is easy to feel hamstrung by uncertainty, to choose disengagement when so little of how we are church right now is what we would choose if it were up to us. And yet, in the face of all that we don't know, there is a lot that we do know too.

What we do know is that we have rebuilding to do. We have worked hard at creating a budget for 2022 that reflects both realism and hope. We are grateful that we have resources, including from the generosity of past generations, as we use this year to rebuild our in-person worship, our ministry with youth and children, our music program, and our offering to new people just beginning to consider if faith and church might be for them. We believe in this rebuilding because, although these times have been difficult and the road ahead challenging, we are also clear about some other fundamental truths.

The truth is that God is calling us to serve and bless. We have seen the impact that our feeding ministries and STEP Centre have. We have seen the lifeline we can provide when others are struggling so much. We have seen the powerful impact of our worship, the message of hope and connection we can facilitate, whether we are online or in person. In terms of discernment, the calling of God on this community of St. George is crystal clear.

The truth is that along with that crystal clear calling is also the reality of astonishing blessing. We have inherited a building, a sanctuary, a wealth of resources, that have been laid down for us by 230 years of faithful people before us. And day by day, month by month, even and especially through the turbulence of Covid, we have continued to find that we have enough food, enough money, enough space, enough time and talent, enough care and prayer, to have something of life-giving significance to offer—for ourselves, for our hurting

world.

The truth is that this matters. The church matters. It matters for us. That's why we keep figuring out how to show up for one another, how to make this work when so many of the givens of how this works have fallen by the wayside. But most importantly, this matters for the world. If we think we have rebuilding to do, that is nothing compared to the rebuilding ahead for us as a people. Mental health has been shattered for too many. The isolation, disconnection and rampant uncertainty of these past few years has taken its toll on all of us economically, physically, emotionally, mentally and spiritually. God is calling us to be part of rebuilding and healing, not just St. George's, but our world. Covid has revealed a lot about who we are, what matters, and what needs to matter more, while at the same time pulling the rug out from underneath us in terms of many of the givens we have taken for granted. More than ever, our witness—of God's loving presence at work in all of us, of our biological and spiritual connectedness, of the power of prayer, of the healing possibility of our own little gifts of time and talent and treasure—needs to be resolutely, generously, courageously on offer.

I am sure that I am not the only one looking back at this juncture, considering what has been lost, what we didn't know and how much we took for granted. I give thanks that, even as we now look forward with so much still unclear and uncertain, we also know the things that matter most.

Associate Priest's Report



The 2021 year continued the challenges set out in 2020 for all of us. Certainly there were moments of lessening tension and stress, and somewhat regained freedom. Yet, here we are at the beginning of 2022 and currently everything looks and feels a lot like the beginning of 2021. In the midst of, and in the face of all of this though, the Church and its ministry continue. The ongoing challenges of ministry and trying to do and be the church have continued for all of us. We have continued to offer as much as we can in the way of services and pastoral visits,

including hospital visits.

We made as much use of our live streaming equipment as possible and have been thankful for the new technology that we have invested in. It has allowed us to have improved quality of video and audio for the live streamed services as well as the in-person services for the four-month period when we had them in the fall. As with any technology, there continues to be the need for troubleshooting and refining.

I am glad to have been able to continue to support our study programs and have been very pleased to work on them with our Assistant Curate, the Rev. Matt Gillard, offering support to Matt in developing and presenting programs himself.

As in 2020, I have continued coordinating the Diocesan Refugee Sponsorship Initiative. Due to the ongoing complications of International travel and a reduction in the speed of processing cases, it has been a much slower year for the program. And yet, the needs of refugees continue to rise and escalate. We continue to focus on what we are able to do and are reassured knowing that helping one family at a time is making the change that is needed, one family at a time.

As I am facing down my last few weeks of ministry at St. George's, I would like to offer my utmost and sincere thanks for the privilege and honour of being able to serve this parish and all of you. It has truly been the best parish I have had the opportunity to serve in, and I give thanks to God for all of you. It is exciting to move on to new challenges, but it is also sad to be leaving you. You have loved and supported my family and I, and I cannot possibly thank you enough for all of that, and for all that you have taught me and shown me about the love of Christ. You all are truly a city of light, shining on a hill, who, together, routinely do more than we could ask or imagine. May God continue to bless you all. I offer this blessing from the Northumbrian Community:

May the Peace of Christ go with you, wherever he may send you. May he guide you through the wilderness, and protect you through the storm. May he bring you home rejoicing at the wonders he has shown you. May he bring you home rejoicing, once again, into our doors.

Assistant Curate



2021 has been a mixture of challenges and changes amidst the isolation of COVID. I have experienced all of this while being involved in many aspects of ministry at St. George's. Some of these have been traditional aspects of a curacy while others have been unexpected.

Between last Vestry and the summer, I continued to assist with worship and our Christian education programs. It was a joy to be able to share in a variety of book studies from Rowan William's *The Dwelling of the Light* and Holly Whitcomb's *Seven Spiritual Gifts of Waiting*, or

Bible studies on the various Resurrection Appearances. Our regular worship has greatly depended on technology as a lifeline connecting us to the homes of our worshiping community.

I have worked with Reverend Scott, personnel from PSI, and our team of volunteers to help keep this functioning to the best of our abilities. When I entered theology I never thought that I would get another chance to use my experiences from film class and stage crew. It has been interesting to see the gifts, knowledge, and experience that have been shared by the whole team of people who fight the Gremlins and keep our livestream working.

This year included a number of professional Milestones. In April I was recommended by the Anglican Committee on Postulants (ACPO) for ordination. Then in September, I was ordained as a transitional deacon. This ordination has meant that I have also been able to take on an increasing number of roles in the parish and that I will continue to serve here as an Assistant Curate. Another role that has changed over the past year has been my involvement in the STEP centre. In February I started going there as a regular part of my work. While there, I assisted Carrie with some of the program development, welcoming clients of the center, and a number of other parts of that job. As summer approached, STEP was able to hire Katherine and my work with the parish started to increase, so my involvement with the STEP centre decreased to a few hours a week. It has been an incredible privilege to work alongside Carrie and Katherine in service to the youth who use the centre. I am excited to see how the STEP centre continues to develop in its service.

This fall we had the challenge of both Martha and Scott being on leave. I am grateful for the trust that Martha and Scott placed in me during their absence but I am exceptionally thankful that they have returned. I am also grateful for all the support that everyone showed while they were away.

Ad Hoc Finance Committee

The Ad Hoc Finance Committee's mandate is to advise Corporation and Parish Council when requested and to monitor the financial status of St. George's investments.

A proposal to consider how to provide a stable source of funding from the Foundation Fund was prepared and forwarded to Corporation. The new method would ensure a more consistent flow of funds for programming but still fulfill the requirement of ensuring that the capital of the fund is protected.

The Committee monitored the investment activity of our accounts held by the Dioceses throughout the year. In 2021 the rate of return to the end of November on our investments was 11.8 %. The return this year is good, but the investments are subject to market forces. St. George's investments, with careful management and monitoring, should be available to support parish programs for the future.

I would like to thank our committee members Dave Bingham, Chuck Burke, Corwin Cambray, Wes Gray, Fred Hanam, Jim Jenter, Sandra Legarde, James Little, Marilyn Pettit, and Canon Martha for their valuable input and support.

Breakfast Program

The Community Breakfast Program at St.George's Church seeks to serve breakfast every morning of the year to all comers, no questions asked. We achieved this goal in 2021, ending the year filled with amazement, giving thanks to God that we were able to meet the needs of so many guests. Throughout the fears and worries of the pandemic, we persevered in the knowledge that we are doing a good work "which God prepared beforehand to be our way of life". We depend on God's provision to sustain the Program through the responses of his people, anticipating how he uses the soft hearts and kind intentions of our volunteers and donors. Thank you to all who share our vision and responded with generous donations of money, food and service.

In 2021 we provided our guests with 33,200 bagged breakfasts, a record daily average of 91. We served a generous breakfast of orange juice, milk, porridge, cereal, toasted sandwiches of Cheeze Whiz or peanut butter and jam, and coffee or tea, opening our door promptly every morning at 7:30 am. Breakfast was prepared and served, food and supplies purchased and delivered, and the Program managed entirely by volunteers — no one received any financial remuneration for their service. All of our over 150 volunteers are fully vaccinated.

The Program is entirely funded by donations of money and food from numerous kind-hearted donors, including many St. George's parishioners who have continued to support the Program over the years. Our food purchases were supplemented by generous donations from individuals, local organizations and food drives organized by Paul Chapman in June and November. We ended the year with a well-stocked pantry. Since we neither sought nor received any money from any level of government, we must balance our income and expenditures. We achieved this in 2021 with donations of \$104,450, about one-third of which came from St. George's parishioners. Overall, the cost per breakfast served is approximately three dollars. We made a monthly donation of \$550 to St. George's towards the cost of operating the kitchen. We appreciate the facilities and support we receive from the church, including the help provided so cheerfully by Johan Braun.

We are so thankful for the faithful service of our volunteers. In particular, three parishioners have provided a continuing example of tireless service, commitment and encouragement that exemplifies the spirit of Christian service. Thank you Dianne Chisholm, Daryl Crosby and Ann Koppel.

We begin 2022 with confidence and optimism knowing that our loving heavenly Father will continue to show his provision and care; God has not given us a spirit of fear but rather 'a spirit of power and of love and of sound mind."

Brotherhood of Anglican Churchment (BAC)

The BAC normally has a year of socializing, eating great meals and being educated and stimulated by guest speakers from both the Parish community and the Niagara Region. Since the onset of COVID-19 in February, 2020, we have not been able to meet to enjoy the fellowship of the meetings.

We have approximately 50 members and are happy to welcome any men of the Parish who would like to join us. When we are able to meet, meetings are held five times a year on the second Tuesday of January, February, April, October, and November. We normally average 25-30 members per meeting. The cost of a full roast beef meal with accompanying salads, roast carrots and potatoes, and including dessert has been \$25.00. Because of rising food costs, we may have to adjust the price.

We would like to thank the volunteers who help set up, serve during our dinners and clean up afterwards. Also we would like to thank those who kindly take time to bake pies for our dinners. Hopefully we will be able to start meeting once again by the fall of 2022. Our major fundraising activity is normally the annual Christmas poinsettia

plant sales program. Due to COVID we were not able to undertake this important project in 2021. We are normally able to donate about \$1,000 to St. George's. Perhaps we will be able to provide the poinsettia program in the fall of 2022. Stay tuned.

Coffee Hour—Virtual

Community & Social Justice



The community and Social Justice team at St. George's got off to a great start in early January 2021 with a small group attending the first meeting. We discussed how we might expand and support the leadership of the many social justice initiatives within the parish and within the greater community. With attendance rapidly growing, we pride ourselves on being a group that supports the ministries of all members.

During the Monday afternoon Zoom meetings, the team grew in its interests. Over the months, we discovered and were drawn to many other social justice initiatives. This inspirational group of leaders offer their time and talents in the hope that their diligence, activism and love of the Lord propels them forward as they work, speak and act in ways that support justice for those who find themselves carrying very heavy burdens.

We discussed and acted on topics such as giving support to youth, to food insecurity, to 2SLGBTQ2+ rights and advocacy training. Many walked for The Coldest Night of the Year. We pursued education for ourselves in matters of addiction, homelessness and Diocesan training for 2SLGBTQ+ issues as well.

One of the greatest educational experiences came when Archdeacon Val Kerr, Reverend Matt and I put our heads together and invited people to "Explore Indigenous Canada" with us for 8 weeks in response to the tragic discovery of the unmarked graves and previously uncounted deaths of innocent children who were in residential schools all across Canada.

Over the course of 2021 we welcomed multiple guest speakers who were gracious enough to share their wisdom, experience and support. We plan to welcome 3 new speakers during our 2022 meetings.

The team members support each other. We share truths of what we have done, of what we have left undone, and most importantly, we listen for what the Heavenly Father calls us to do.

Community Dinners

For the second year in a row, the Community dinner offered monthly bagged take-out dinners on the 4th Wednesday of each month from April to October. With the lockdown in March 2020, we switched to bagged take -out dinners from the sit-down meals previously offered in the large gym. Who knew the same process would continue through 2021?

The Community Dinner Program started at Grace Anglican Church in May of 2014 and was discontinued after an attempt to offer it at St. George's. Dinners were restarted in May 2018 and to date we have served almost 2,400 meals. In 2021, we were able to provide a dinner including a main course, fresh salad, roll, juice, dessert, and water for just over \$2.50 per person. We offered a different main course each month and we tried some new recipes including beef stew and a deconstructed chicken parmesan casserole.

Through the efforts of a small but strong volunteer team we have been able to continue the dinners and maintain contact with our guests, but the sense of community was lost both by the guests who could no longer sit inside and enjoy their meal and by our volunteers who worked in managed shifts and did not have the same contact with each other. On nice summer nights, you could find people on Wednesday night sitting on the rocks in groups enjoying their dinners. And we had a group of guests that arrived early and socialized before the doors opened. They always asked the volunteers as they came in, what is on the menu tonight?

In previous years we had received the proceeds of the Spring Frolic event to help us fund our program. With COVID, that Event could not take place again in 2021. The generosity of our parishioners made up the difference as over \$ 1,200 in donations was contributed. We also received fresh fruit, bottled water and ingredients for our dinners from the caring community here at St George's. And the donation of time from all the volunteers, many of whom were there each and every month, is priceless. All these contributions meant that we were able to provide meals and still have a surplus of cash to start off next year.

We look forward, not sure how far, to returning to a sit-down format and would love for others to join this worthwhile community outreach initiative.

Faith and Light Ministry

We no longer gather at St. George's to share a meal and spend time together, to share joys and concerns, pray, have fun, and laugh (a lot), sing, make music and listen to God's word. Like most of society, we have moved to using technology to support our monthly meetings. We gather together on Zoom and although there is no food, we are still able to laugh, have fun, share our joys and concerns (the suns and clouds of our lives – a modified version of the Jesuit discipline of the examen).

Labyrinth

The labyrinth is a spiritual tool that can be used as a place for prayer and meditation. The themes of spiritual journey and following God's way are common in the scriptures. Our faith journey is seldom a linear process. The twists and turns of the labyrinth can represent our faith journey and facilitate our prayer and reflection.



St. George's is fortunate to have a beautiful canvas labyrinth modelled after one of the most famous and familiar Christian labyrinths which was created in 1215A.D. in the cathedral of Chartres, just outside of Paris, France. In the past, from September to June this labyrinth was set up in the gym for monthly labyrinth walks, a time to journey both individually and as a group.

With the onset of Covid restrictions, these walks have been suspended. While we have been unable to meet as a group on a regular basis, some in the group have found creative ways to use a labyrinth as a tool for prayer.

The organization Veriditas (www.veriditas.org) provides information and teaching on labyrinths as well as organized world-wide 'finger' labyrinth guided walks and meditations. You can download and print a paper labyrinth to use for personal prayer. I have includes a copy following this report.



A small group of walkers came together in August to visit the outdoor labyrinth at the Public Library in Niagara-on-the-Lake which is available to the public for personal use. It is located behind the library at 10 Anderson Lane, Niagara-on-the-Lake.

We look forward to a time when we may again come together and resume our monthly Saturday morning labyrinth walks and we welcome anyone who is interested in learning more to join us.

Brian Kerley was key in teaching a small team of keen volunteers to help with audio and visual support, which has allowed the Advent Cafe team more independence and freedom to explore and expand.

I began building on a repertoire of recurring songs through the year that folks at home were encouraged to sing along to each week he was leading. I invited my friend and roommate Maddie Webber to sing at multiple services, and look forward to more collaboration in the near future when the opportunities arise. <u>Property Management Committee – A Year in Review</u>

We entered the year in lockdown, and the Return to In-Person Worship Taskforce continued to be prepared with ever evolving COVID protocols for our eventual return to in-person worship in September. We had a mere four months together at church until our next lockdown just before Christmas.

We thoughtfully avoided having to install new vinyl flooring in the Swan in lieu of refinishing the existing wood floors by Len Hume in May. The refinishing will extend the lifespan of this hardwood flooring, and the Breakfast Program volunteers commented that they were quite pleased with the results.

Roof repairs to the low-slope roof above the church office were completed by Dykstra Roofing in June alleviating all the water intrusion problems occurring over time.

In July, the uneven brick pavers of the east ramp were removed and replaced with poured concrete, by Jack Harper Construction. Also, the steeple lightning arrest system was inspected, and all was found to be in good working order.



Work was done to upgrade the sound and video equipment in the church. After testing out new equipment in late December, 2020, permanent installation of the new equipment was completed in early 2021. Two new cameras and the computer system to run them for livestreaming of services, and a new sound mixing console including new wireless microphones, as well as two microphones to capture the choir were set up and installed professionally by local business, Production Service Industries.

Surveys were sent out to kitchen stakeholders for future re-design considerations. The re-design is currently on hold until further notice. Also, the oven temp calibration was repaired for the stove in the main kitchen.

In September, windows and doors at the rear of church were painted by Neil & Celeste Allyn, Peter and Stella Schafrick. Also in the summer, Celeste Allyn did most of the weeding of the front garden beds, and clean-up by removing problematic juniper bushes as well as other gardening work like planting fall mums. Peter Schafrick in his role as Fire Safety Coordinator updated all defibrillators with new batteries and paddles. CPR training is to be organized when possible with COVID protocols.

In October, the church experienced extensive noise and vibrations from construction next door at the Folk Arts

Multicultural Building. This caused some collateral damage with broken ceiling light fixtures and considerable movement in the structure of the Bear's Den. A claim was opened with insurance as well as a claim with the City of St Catharines. The Fire Department inspected all Orders to Comply, and officially closed out the file. As a result, the Change of Use permit application was closed out as well.

In November, Peter Schafrick skillfully put fresh new coats of paint in the Asbil Lounge, ready for use when we meet in the space again. New carbon monoxide detectors were also installed throughout the lower level by Johan. This was to follow up on a recommendation made by our insurance company.

STEP Centre



For the STEP Centre, 2021 was a year filled with interesting challenges and opportunities for growth. We continued to fulfil our mandate to provide services to youth in our community, while adapting to their specific needs and expanding the Centre and programs within the restrictions imposed by the

pandemic.

Our response to the COVID-19 pandemic had to balance the continuing needs of our community members and clients while keeping everyone safe and protected as much as possible. It was our decision to remain open to inperson services throughout the pandemic as many other agencies closed or offered online services only. We were able to continue to offer warm clothes, space, and services for all youth who needed it. We served a small group of regular visitors, while also welcoming a number of folks who would visit sporadically for specific needs.

Carrie offered one-on-one counselling in person to a number of clients over the year. We have received counselling referrals from a variety of sources across the region and are eager to spread the word about the fact that we have no wait list and free counselling to anyone ages 16-24.

We welcomed Katherine Kerley as the STEP Youth Worker in June. Katherine brought a new energy for implementing programming and making STEP the best it can be. Katherine was thrilled to join the STEP team at St. George's, and has been a crucial part of keeping STEP moving forward this past year.

In the summer, we began a series of weekly programs to offer our clients including arts and crafts, music, life skills, and drop-in sessions. We quickly adapted to feedback from clients to make the programs more accessible and suited to client needs. We acquired a number of djembe drums thanks to a generous donation, as well as two full sets of knitting needles, also thanks to a generous donation from a St. George's parishioner. Clients did tie dye, made birdhouses, painted in the style of Tom Thompson, made friendship bracelets, and a number of clients have learned or relearned how to knit.

Summer also brought the opportunity for our clients to help create the STEP community garden. We planted



cucumbers, tomatoes, beans, and a number of herbs. It was so fulfilling and exciting for our clients to watch their hard work and care literally bear fruit. We had more tomatoes than we knew what to do with! Our garden was accessible to anyone who wanted to gather from it, and a number of our community members regularly took tomatoes and cucumbers home.

Our Wellness Community Connections program launched this past year, offering weekly Zoom sessions to youth ages 12-15 on a variety of mental health and wellness topics. We had a small

core group of participants and some excellent discussions on self care, living through the pandemic, emotions, and more.

In September, we were joined by Lisa Brown, a Bachelor of Social Work placement student from McMaster University. Lisa quickly became a valued member of the team, providing insight and suggestions with a fresh perspective, as well as contributing to program presentations and taking on a counselling client as she became more comfortable and confident. We are so thrilled to have had her with us and wish her the very best as she finishes her degree and graduates this year.

Also in September, we had our initial gathering of the STEP Advisory Board. Our board members come from a variety of backgrounds and have proven invaluable in helping promote STEP, connect us with community leaders and resources, and provide guidance around next steps. Thanks to the persistence of our board members, we had a visit from MPP Jennie Stevens in October, and a visit from Mayor Walter Sendzik in November. Both were eager to learn about the services offered at STEP and provide support to us in getting the word out to other agencies for referrals.

October brought an exciting partnership with Soaring Eagles, an alternative education school in the Niagara Catholic District School Board. We adapted our Wellness Community Connections programs to the specific needs of the students in this school to bring a Wellness Community Circle program to life. We have had two Zoom and one in-person gathering to talk about self care, healthy relationships and boundaries, and dealing with emotions.

With the help of Lisa, we applied in October for a Niagara Community Foundation mini grant to create new signage for STEP that would make it easier for folks to find us. We are so pleased to report that we were successful in our grant application and will be ordering and installing new signs in the coming month.

Our in-person services were temporarily disrupted for the month of December due to some concerns about the building. However, we were thrilled to learn that we were able to return to our space in January. We joined the RRPC Innovation Foundation in December to help with their first Youth Yuletide event. We provided 50 hygiene kits to folks in need across the city and greeted some folks in person who stopped by for a warm beverage or some winter apparel.

In summary, 2021 was a year of tremendous growth for STEP against a backdrop of restrictions and challenges due to the pandemic. We are eager for what lies ahead this coming year and hope to welcome more clients and grow even further to become a household name in the Niagara Region as a provider of services for youth.

Stewardship

Well, particularly in this time of Covid when few washrooms are available close by for our Breakfast Program guests, it's cleaning up the "you know what" and it doesn't get left there by dogs! Johan will definitely not be retiring fully when he leaves us. <u>Water Project—Pimatiziwin Nipi – Annual Report 2021</u>

"Anchored in God's faithfulness, we have sought to respond to an URGENT need in Indigenous communities. Systemic brutalities built into Indigenous life have meant that basic needs, like access to clean water, are not being met. It is this reality which has motivated our response."

- Archbishop Mark MacDonald, Indigenous Anglican Church of Canada

2021 marked the ten year anniversary of Pimatiziwin Nipi. We came together a decade ago, not because of an idea, but because of a question. "What can we do?" A network developed with Archbishop Mark MacDonald as our leader simply because people across Canada were aware of the systemic injustice and cruelty that sees so many Indigenous communities across Canada without access to clean water, and we believed that there must be something that we could do in response.

The uncovering of unmarked graves on the sites of former residential schools across Canada in 2021 has furthered the bringing to light of truths that Canadians have been reluctant to see about the cost of Canada's treatment of Indigenous peoples and the need for truth and reconciliation going forward. This is not just part of Canada's past, it is a truth at the centre of Canada's present. We hear from Indigenous leaders that they are hearing of youth suicides and overdoses on a daily basis. The resources that they would normally bring in to help communities cope, including pastoral care, can't be brought in because of COVID. "The reality is that we're overcome by grief and difficulty," says Archbishop Mark.

Since 2013, Pimatisiwin Nipi (Living Waters) Group has partnered with the Northern Ontario community of Pikangikum, Ontario and with The Primate's World Relief and Development Fund to install safe drinking water and indoor plumbing in the homes that need it the most.

In 2021, our work expanded to begin the Mishamikoweesh Water Partnership.

Snapshot of Mishamikoweesh:

- Bishop Lydia Mamakwa is the only paid clergy person in her diocese. She lives in Kingfisher Lake.
- Many clergy in the diocese don't speak English. Many children went into hiding when the RCMP came to take children to residential schools.
- Unique area and a lot of needs with regards to water.
- 25 First Nations within its jurisdiction.
- Area on Northern Ontario that is roughly the border of Ontario and Manitoba, all the way to James
 Bay. Our focus would be in Northern Ontario because the area in time to time. Northern Manitoba has
 access to other sources of funding currently.
- Mishamikweesh means Big Beaver House. There is a rock formation that looks like a Beaver House.
 William Winter, spiritual leader, had this vision many decades ago for this area to have their own bishop, diocese, seminary, and churches, run by Indigenous leadership. This seemed incredible at the time in the 1930s and 1940s. And so when this new diocese came about, it was named after William Winter's vision.

Across Mishamikoweesh, water safety is a critical need. We see this as an important next chapter in extending the work we began a decade ago.



Mishamikoweesh leadership identify clean water as central to their vision of a good life for their people. In response, our work will:

- -partner with PWRDF and Mishamikoweesh leadership to develop Indigenous-led, high impact water projects across these Northern communities.
- -each project will be oriented toward the goal of Indigenous communities being able to access fresh and safe drinking water, prioritizing their connection to the abundance of the land.

St. George's contributed over \$3,600 to the Water Project this past December as people chose to give the gift of Water to their loved ones as Christmas gifts. Thank you for your generosity and care, St. George's! We await tallies from PWRDF (which tend to come in from the early months of the new year) regarding the money this new Partnership has been able to raise in our Advent 2021 fundraising campaign. This work with Mishamikoweesh is just beginning, and we look forward with hope and faith for how we can build this partnership for many years to come and in ways that will bring concrete and lasting change.


