Mary Magdalene, Welcoming a Co-Rector, & Other Fall Happenings

Biblical Scholar, Elizabeth Schrader, tells the story of praying to the Virgin Mary in a New York Church garden. Elizabeth was a pop musician and songwriter at the time and had no thoughts of religious leadership. She heard a woman's voice reply to her prayer that day: "You might want to ask Mary Magdalene about that." This surprising response led Elizabeth on a search to better know Mary Magdalene. Her exploration eventually led her to leave her recording career, earn her PhD in Biblical studies, and make research discoveries in the process that have sparked viral excitement across the Christian church. Her discoveries centre on the person of Mary Magdalene—how she appears in Scripture, how her story has been misunderstood or compromised over the past two thousand years, and what ancient witness has been preserved in our earliest Biblical manuscripts to help us today to see this important figure, central to the life and ministry of Jesus, in a new light.

Mary Magdalene was a woman who was at the centre of Jesus' circle and who has intrigued and mystified people of faith across Christian history. The church has been quick to misrepresent her as a prostitute, and popular Christian culture has, for centuries, diminished her as a romantic temptress to Jesus or a woman hopelessly besotted with a Saviour not available for that kind of

love. She is easily confused with other Marys of the New Testament, and yet, this new biblical research suggests that some of this confusion might actually help us to understand much more clearly just how central Mary Magdalene was to the leadership of the early church and what an important figure she was in the life of Jesus. I am very much looking forward to this fall's deep dive into the life and Biblical witness of Mary on Tuesdays from 7pm to 8:30pm, starting September 19th.

Of course, Bible Study isn't the only exciting thing happening this fall. Across this newsletter, you'll hear about so much that we're looking forward to as a church family—whether it's special worship services and the ongoing richness of our music program, or the offerings for youth and children of our parish, or opportunities of fun and fellowship, or the many ways to be part of how our church cares for our neighbour and responds to the needs of the world around us.


At the start of the summer, we had an exciting announcement to share with the parish. The Reverend Tom Vaughan will be starting as Co-Rector of St. George's on November 6th. The idea of a co-rectorship at St. George's has been on my mind for many years, mostly because of how clearly this parish has been blessed in a variety of iterations by a team approach to pastoral ministry.

The Corporation of St. George's was excited by the possibility of being able to enrich our current team with the gifts of a seasoned and gifted senior priest of the church, and through a lot of careful discernment together, and with our Bishop, we were able to secure Tom's appointment. A co-rectorship is a different kind of model for the church, one in which Tom and I will both be full time and sharing in the role of lead priest of St. George's. Reverend Mike, our church's Assistant Curate, will continue in the excellent ministry work he is doing. Mike offers our community such blessing and support, and Tom and I, and our congregation, will continue together to support him in the growing edge of settling into ordained leadership in the church. We believe that our whole team can be a life-giving model for the wider church at this time and will allow St. George's every opportunity to continue to build on the good work that we are doing and to grow and deepen our community of faith.

On a more specifically personal note, Tom and his wife—the Reverend Krista Hilton—and their daughters Joy and Ivy are close friends of our family. Krista and their daughters have been a regular part of our St. George's family for many years now and are well known here. Tom's ministry offerings in Welland, and in the churches he has served over his two decades of pastoral experience, are exceptional, and I could not be happier for St. George's in getting to welcome this gifted priest to our leadership team. I know that Tom and I will complement and support one another in this team model, and I look forward with a profound sense of gratitude to the time ahead.

I love that story of Elizabeth Schrader in the garden receiving a prayer response which in turn led her into a relationship with Mary Magdalene that is having such a wide-reaching impact on Christians all across the globe. It speaks to the things that continue to keep me energized and grateful to be part of the church and a follower of Jesus: the power of prayer, the journey of faith that is always full of surprise and new light, the blessing of the Body of Christ, the richness of learning and growing because of the offerings of another.



## The Community Breakfast Program at St. George's Church



For almost 30 years the Breakfast Program has been synonymous with St. George's. Serving breakfast every morning of the year with kindness to all comers, no questions asked. Jeams of volunteers serve breakfast to an average of 90 guests daily.

The Breakfast Program provides opportunities for good works of service in several areas:

- 1. As a kitchen volunteer preparing, serving and cleaning up after breakfast. Volunteers typically work one day per month 6:30-9:00 am.
- 2. As a dining room host, interacting with our guests and helping to provide a safe and welcoming environment. Hosts typically serve two to four days per month from 7:15 - 8:45 am.
- 3. As a shopper, purchasing and transporting food and supplies to the kitchen. Shoppers work on their own schedule, typically making purchases every two weeks or so.
- 4. By donating cash or food. Gifts of cash may be made through your regular church offering by indicting your gift is for the "Breakfast Program". Donations of food, particularly boxes of cereal, may be dropped off at the back of the church any Sunday morning or directly in the kitchen if you prefer.



We always welcome new volunteers. Working together gives us a chance to get to know each other better and to help out the very needy people in our community.

The Community Dinner Program started at Grace Anglican Church in May of 2014. When Grace joined St. George's in early 2017, an attempt was made to continue the monthly program. The increase in numbers of guests at a downtown parish was overwhelming to the small group of volunteers. Canon Michael Mondloch invited anyone interested in rebooting the community dinner program to meet on April 30, 2018. The Community Dinners were reborn at that meeting to fill in the gap left by *Out of the Cold* which provides dinners at St George's from November through early April. With a mix of those who have brought the experience of previous dinners and those desiring to serve in a new way, we provided healthy dinners on the 4th Wednesday of the month for 6 months starting in May. The following year we added April to the schedule so that we filled in as soon as the *Out of the Cold* dinners ended.

The dual purpose behind these dinners was to build community while providing a healthy dinner to anyone who came. The sense of community that grew among the volunteers spilled over to the guests creating a pleasant dinner experience for our guests. Parishioners joined for the dinners. We served takeout dinners through the COVID pandemic, and this year returned to in person dining. We also added BBQs to our offerings in conjunction with the summer Advent Café, providing a picnic on the lawn. We have served over 3,500 dinners.
