Dear St. George's,

"It is such a beautiful church." This is a comment that I hear regularly from parishioners, visitors, guests, and passersby alike. This is a multi-layered comment. It's about the aesthetics of our church—the wood carvings, the historic architecture, the intricacy of the stained

glass, the quirkiness of hidden doors and secret hallways. Each bespoke feature of the building says something about the history of this city and community of faith, about how God has been experienced at work in the lives of the faithful, about inviting people here and now to pause in their busy lives and to contemplate, to pray, to wonder, to look beyond the everyday and consider the presence of the living God. Each generation that has gone before us has invested in architecture, artisan and artistic works. In doing so, they sought to give expression to their walk with God, and all of those contributions have added up to a building that is completely unique and that is priceless because it could never be replicated.

But those comments about the church's beauty say something more. You don't have to spend very long in our church building to get a sense of presence, prayer, service, witness. I say it all the time, and so do others who have lived in and loved this church: It is a thin space. The bricks and mortar have soaked up something of the prayer and praise and friendship and community that has been shaped and offered here. It feels just a little easier here to feel God's closeness. I can just about see out of the corner of my eye those faithful friends whose lives were so intimately woven into the fabric of this community, whose imprint helped to shape who St. George's is, and whose voices are surely now joined with the saints in heaven and gathered even more fully around God's great banquet. When we are here, they don't feel so far away.

And finally, the beauty that people name isn't just about how the church looks and what it has done in the past. The beauty is about the here and now engagement with the most critical needs and greatest challenges people face. It's about doors open every day of the year to offer food and welcome to the people of St. Catharines. It's about bells ringing and organ pipes filling, words and songs being lifted up, people gathering and livestream connecting, oatmeal cooking and coffee percolating, so that we can wrap our community in prayer, so that people of all ages can bring the heartbreaks and challenges and deepest questions of life and be met by the love and promise and guidance of God.

This coming year will be about many things, particularly as we continue to develop our four ministry priorities of Outreach, Fellowship, Music and Youth. We look forward to the many spectacular offerings of our choir, the developing voices of Little Dragons Children's Choir, the creative opportunities for faith exploration at Advent Café and our various studies. We seek to be faithful in how we show up every day ready to serve our

community and bear witness to God's love in concrete ways. We expect to have new ministries develop as we attend to God's leading in our community's life.

And supporting all of the things we are continuing and developing will be our Restoration Project, which is this generation's invitation to care for the gift of faith that has been passed on to us, and to leave our imprint on this building so that it can strengthen faith and equip loving service now and for generations to come.

The scaffolding is going up on the day that I write this letter. This work will take us through the first half of this year and will repair historic woodwork and stucco on the exterior of our church, as well as preserving it against wear and tear and damage for the years ahead. It is a massive project, and it is a sacred responsibility for our community today to be able to treasure the gift of this church, giving thanks both for what we are doing now and investing in the future to come.

This time last year, and based on our best projections, we forecast this work costing us \$434,000 and were able to budget to pay for this from a generous bequest the church had received. Because of escalating construction costs generally, and the expertise required to work on our historic building specifically, we had to enlist the support of St. George's to approve an extra \$200,000 for this work. Money has started to come in to address this shortfall. Some people are choosing to make a memorial donation in thanksgiving for a loved one. Others are choosing to make an offering directly to the project and simply in recognition of the value they place in this church and what it means. The year ahead will see that invitation to giving at the forefront of life at St. George's. It is our hope and prayer that both the people of our church and the wider community will take stock of how God's blessings have been made known in the beauty and the resource that is this church building and that we will have more than enough financial resources to equip this exciting and important work.

Please join with us in considering that beauty that is always noted when discussing St. George's. What beauty do you feel and experience here? How do you see faith strengthened, loving service equipped and a history of Christian witness in St. Catharines made possible in this beauty? How can you be part of this generation's sacred responsibility in caring for this building—now and for generations to come?

Dear St. George's

When I say thank you to parishioners, one of the responses is often "Oh, it's nothing, really! " It occurs to me that we frequently overlook how something seemingly small can be seismic in touching lives with the love of God.

Malcolm Gladwell's book The Tipping Point examines how small

But they all have ripple effects here at St George's, and beyond, for God's kingdom on earth. These gestures contribute to the beautiful life in our community as followers of Jesus. These moments are grace-filled moments, when God's goodness and love flow. It's beautiful and it's generous, and it's all about making those ripples that spread God's love.

As I reflect on 2024 in our beloved community, I see countless ways we can experience God's grace. Perhaps it's during a hymn with the organ building to a crescendo; at the breakfast program when observing an act of kindness; or within the parish office when an unexpected note arrives. These are just a few of the ways God pours blessings upon us as we create that ripple effect.

We create this ripple effect via a spirit of cooperation, which I see throughout our community. An example of this cooperation can be found in the formation of the Little Dragons children's choir. An animation team worked with Brad to do the groundwork to launch the program while Tanya and Melissa supported Brad on Thursday night rehearsals. With a team approach, there has been a strong beginning to the program. And, again, it's the little things that end up being seismic in their impact, furthering the kingdom beyond our community.

We continue to see this theme in the four pillars of outreach, music, youth, and fellowship. From two rectors working in tandem, to our staff, wardens, and parish council working together, there are so many instances in which we cooperate together to further the kingdom within our community. May I say that it continues to be an honour to share in ministry here and to serve as co-rector of this beautiful community.

Thank you to everyone who contributes to building this Christian community, creating ripple effects that lead to profound impacts in the lives of all God's people.

NEWCOMER'S AND CONCIERGE REPORT



What does it mean as a congregation to demonstrate radical hospitality? We can ask questions such as:

How do we invite people into our congregation?

How are we helping newcomers feel comfortable in our worship?

How are we inviting new people to experience Christian life among us?

Our newcomers' program in 2024, run by the support of the Reverend Alan Maclean and Sandra Legarde, met every few months and hosted lunch after worship. During the lunches, name tags were issued, pizza was served, and we invited everyone to introduce themselves. We also provided space to talk about how God is at work in our lives. We frequently heard common threads such as the steady hand of God, as well as the disruptive Holy Spirit breaking in when we least expected it! The clergy present at the lunches took the opportunity to share how we were led to St. George's and our experience of feeling honoured and privileged to be clergy at St. George's.

I often ask myself, when people visit on Sunday, what are their expectations of the experience? My assumption is that they wish to experience God's loving presence, to be welcomed graciously, and to be given assistance in navigating the practical matters of worship.

Thinking of these practical matters, in the fall, we made our latest addition to our newcomers' program by introducing a concierge ministry. With Lindsey Wilton's organization, this new team has been equipped to greet visitors on Sunday by beginning with a friendly message during the announcements; the team keeps an eye out for any needs during the worship service, such as worshippers arriving through the side door who need a bulletin. The team members keep in mind the questions posed above and look for opportunities to create a welcoming, inviting worship experience.

The concierge ministry is one example of the radical hospitality all of us are called upon to provide. We all have a role to play: the clergy, the staff, and parishioners all have opportunities to practice this radical hospitality, through the example set for us in Jesus. The next time we're at coffee hour and we see someone standing alone, can we hear God nudging us forward to offer a smile and friendly words?

As a community, let us continue to be guided by the Holy Spirit so that we can offer radical hospitality to everyone who enters the doors of St. George's!

The Music Ministry of St. George's Anglican Church

For the music ministry and the choir of St. George's, the past year has been a delightful expression of community, worship and joy. Meaningful services, concerts and fundraisers were met by an enthusiastic congregation/audience, symbolizing the foundational significance of our music program in the parish but also in the community at large. It has been deeply encouraging to witness the growth of the choir and the music program, and to be supported by so many parishioners, clergy and community members, consistently showing up to the choir's events and giving support in a myriad of ways.



The year's achievements, accomplishments and highlights included a full roster of festival services including a fulsome Holy Week (featuring choir, soloists, brass, timpani and organ), Remembrance Day Requiem (this year featuring the Faure Requiem with strings and organ), and one of the year's biggest highlights - Lessons and Carols,

welcoming a full church and offering a wide variety of Christmas carols and anthems to ring in the season. Many said it was one of their favourite Carol Services they've ever attended, and the choir worked incredibly hard to offer something special to the community. We had three Christmas Eve services that were all well-attended, with special musical offerings at each.

A new and exciting endeavour this past term has been the launch of the "Little Dragons Children's Choir", which, since starting in June, has already seen numbers upwards of fifteen and counting. The mission of "The Little Dragons" is to engage children and youth in a free, inclusive and affirming musical community, with the aim of improving musical skills, and providing opportunity for the children of our city. The 4pm Christmas Eve service marked the choir's first performance, which was received by an enthusiastic congregation of family, friends and parishioners. 2025 will see the continued growth of "The Little Dragons", and we look forward to welcoming more choristers and providing our congregation with more musical offerings.



Last spring was the inaugural "Shine All Your Light" fundraiser concert in benefit of the music program of St. George's, which was a rousing success. We filled the church with an enthusiastic audience, and the choir sang a selection of varying lighthearted and fun pieces, interspersed with dazzling solos, duets and small group performances. The talent on display was inspiring and the concert was a testament to the dedication of this choir and the support received by the community. We raised around \$4000 for the program and look forward to the next one this coming spring.



2025 is brimming with possibility and many exciting plans are on the horizon. Upcoming highlights include plans to host a regional church choir workshop, a new choral scholar mentorship program, more substantial engagements with the Niagara Symphony Orchestra and other regional arts organizations, Evensong collaborations with Christ Church Cathedral and the Royal School of Church Music, new grant

opportunities with the support of the Diocese of Niagara and the Anglican Foundation "Say Yes to Kids" campaign, and of course, more engaging music and worship offerings to our city and our church.

Assistant Curate



The most significant event for me in my ministry and personally was my ordination to the Priesthood in September. Thank you to all of you who showed me so much kindness at the time, it really meant a lot. The most obvious way that this has changed my ministry is that I began undertaking sacramental ministry, principally presiding at the altar on Sundays and Wednesday. I also had the privilege of baptising for the first time this December. Less noticeably, I am able to anoint

and lay on hands when visiting people. Visiting continued to be a major way that I used my time over the last year and one that gave me great joy. All this is in addition to the activities I began as a deacon and lay pastoral associate such as preaching and leading morning prayer.



I continued my involvement in the Breakfast Program: I was a host every Wednesday and have been a member of a team that volunteers on the first Tuesday of the month. Along with the Co-Rectors I was a pastoral presence in the Swan on Sundays. I enjoyed the company of many of our guests who made time to talk to me. If nothing else I hope I have brightened the day of a few people and helped in the work of creating a generous and welcoming space, which is the core mission of our Breakfast Program. I also assisted Duncan and Nancy Moffett in organizing a monthly service of worship for guests. The face that God shows to the world in Jesus is one of compassion; when I am visiting and helping with the breakfast program, I have felt closest to Jesus, and for that I am very grateful.

I continued conducting a monthly service at Henley House, a long-term care home. In 2024 I was joined in this work by MJ Schmidt, who brings many gifts to this ministry which is greatly appreciated by the residents who attend.

I continued assisting with the leadership of Super Tuesday; I led the study of the Bishop's Lenten Book, <u>Being Disciples: Essentials of the Christian Life</u> by Rowan Williams. In Easter I helped Alan McLean lead a book study on <u>God and You: Prayer as a Personal</u> <u>Relationship</u>, by William A. Barry. In the fall, along with the Co-Rectors, I helped lead our discussion on the TV series <u>The Chosen</u>. I always look forward to our Tuesday night discussion, often I end the evening seeing the topic we discussed differently than at the start. I also shared in the leadership of the Families Group, which is now a lively community of young parents who get together monthly to enjoy food and each other's company and to discuss God and life together.

Additionally, I contributed through my membership on the Visitors Committee, Social Justice Committee, and the Prayer Chain.

By the time you read this it is likely that my appointment as your Curate will have concluded and I will have moved on to a new parish. I arrived at St George's in April 2022, first as Lay Pastoral Associate. I am very grateful to the investment you made in me and my ministry over that time. Moreover thank you for making me and my family so welcome here. I am much more myself for having been formed by this parish. If my future ministry is in any way useful, a large part of it will be because of what I have

learnt from this warm and vibrant community. I will always carry a bit of St. George's with me and I will look from afar with joy and gratitude as you continue to be a home for hope in St. Catharines.

Wednesday Noon Service

Children and Youth Programming

Sunday School

We decided this year that children and youth programming was one of our four main focuses on rebuilding. We made many changes to try to implement growth and continued success. During the Pandemic, when we returned to church our numbers in the Sunday school classroom were 0-3 usually. However, by the end of 2024 we averaged 9-15. Definitely quite a drastic change in numbers. Some of the changes that we have made to our children and youth programming are monthly meetings: I meet with clergy members to go over schedules, plans and ideas. We support each other and use this time to implement new ideas and strengthen the current ones.



We have also brought back Children's Liturgy. We have made some changes; however, we are getting the children involved in the service during this time. We had the Sunday School participate each Sunday of Advent, by lighting the candles and listening and participating in a brief lesson from our Clergy team.

We have also started a children's choir. "The Little

Dragons". Brad and I are running this program as a team. We meet weekly, practice music and play games. It has been a great success so far. 9-13 children in attendance weekly. We had our first performance at the Christmas Eve family service.

When we have a Baptism at St. George's, I am part of the preparation for the Baptism. This allows me to meet the family, discuss our children/youth programming and show them the classroom and make connections. I then follow up afterwards with information regarding upcoming events and dates. We offered Communion classes this past year. We had 3 participants. It was a great success. This will be offered again in the spring 2025.

We had a very successful Vacation Bible School "VBS" this past summer. We had 15 children attend, 8 of those children had never been to St. George's before. We also had 4 youth helpers for the week. It was wonderful. We also had 3 of those attendees join the children's choir.

We have continued our Family Group as well. Meeting monthly, with pizza, learning and the parents getting time to discuss a book and enjoy fellowship with one another. The children get time to play as a group. A very high energetic evening. This program has grown well, 4-6 families per month.



Overall, we have come a long way with our Sunday school program. So many more exciting things to come.

It was so fun and engaging. The group dynamic was fabulous. We had 8 youth and 7 adults and 1 dog join in on the walk. We are so thankful for that time spent together as a group.

Our youth group will continue to meet for fun events, basketball games, and helping out at the Church. The bond the youth have has grown so much this year. One of our very own youth said, "Our

group is like a family"

Labyrinth Vestry Report 2024

"And when you turn to the right or when you turn to the left, your ears shall hear a word behind you, saying, 'This is the way; walk in it." (Isaiah 30:21)

In the fall of 2024, regular monthly labyrinth walks resumed after a pause during the years of Covid.

Walking the labyrinth is the spiritual discipline of setting aside a time and a space to walk meditatively with God. The labyrinth at St. George's is a large, 40' diameter canvas pathway modelled after the labyrinth in Chartres, France. It is not a puzzle; it is a single path to be followed to the centre and then out. Many people can journey at the same time but most often each is on their own personal journey. It can be a time of prayer, meditation, relaxation and spiritual refreshment.

The themes of spiritual journey and following God's way are common in the scriptures. Our faith journey is seldom a linear process. The twists and turns of the labyrinth can represent our faith journey and facilitate our prayer and reflection.

The labyrinth group meets monthly from September through May on the fourth Saturday afternoon of each month. In September and May, weather permitting, the group uses an outdoor labyrinth in the community to provide a different experience. This year we added a walk on May 4 in recognition of World Labyrinth Day. This is a day when people around the world walk a labyrinth at 1:00 p.m. in their respective time zones, a moving meditation for world peace.

While each person's journey is an individual one, we begin and close the group with prayer and a reflection or scripture reading. This past year we also introduced the concept of walking with a common intention. We dedicated one walk to an intention we developed together. Labyrinth walks are facilitated by Stephanie Wilton-Duncan or Deb Kostialik. We are extremely grateful to Jim Jenter for liaising with St. George's and for his guidance in setup and clean up.

New walkers are always welcome, and brief instruction is provided as needed.

MEAL KITS - 2025 - Supporting Community Care

In 2020 Anglicans in Action (six Anglican Churches in St. Catharines) led a communitywide response to help address food insecurity in Niagara with the Meal in a Bag project. Five churches now Involved are Church of the Transfiguration, St. Barnabas, St. Columbus, St. George's, and St. Thomas. Each week volunteers pack bags at home or in a church group then deliver them to Community Care at 12 North St. St. Catharines or Community Care in Thorold for distribution to their clients. The easy-to-prepare recipes with the food provided in the bag can be prepared either in an oven, or on a stovetop, and will feed a family of four. A copy of the recipe is included in the Meal Bag. Each recipe closes - Packed with loving care especially for you by Anglicans in Action ENJOY! Since 2020 through the end of 2024 up to 177,504 individuals have been fed. In 2024 the bags have fed up to 55,324. Of these St. George's produced 2,496 bags feeding up to 9,984 Individuals.

Another Meal Bag Project of Anglicans in Action – Single Bags



In the fall of 2021 Community Care made Anglicans in Action aware of the need for a food bag to feed those who are single and who had nowhere to cook food and often no utensils. These bags required special care as the food must all be packaged but only accessible for those eating it. A single bag was decided with items that could be eaten without having to heat it and if in a can it is easy to open. This means flip-top cans of meat, beans etc. a spoon and a napkin. **In** 2024, 5096 bags were done feeding 5096 people.

This program has also brought community and fellowship to some of the volunteers as they work together to shop and make bags. The program is Christ's love in action.

The programs are supported through giving personal donations, the Diocese and Community Grants.

COMMMUNITY DINNER PROGRAM REPORT 2024

The Community Dinner Program is part of the meal ministry at St. George's. It is a free meal for anyone who wants to participate, no questions asked. It is also an intentional



time of offering a tasty meal using dishes and tablecloths in a friendly caring space.

We held 7 monthly dinners from April to October, on the fourth Wednesday of each month. This year we had over 400 guests and served over 650 meals, a decrease in the number of guests and the number of meals served over 2023. A program organized by NorthEnd church operating out of St Barnabas Church offered a meal each Wednesday. It is our belief that this impacted on our numbers. Out of the Cold took over in early November. We will return in April 2025.

Since this program started at St George's in 2017, we have served 4,400 meals. The Program carried over from Grace Anglican Church and many of our volunteers today worked on the program there. There was a short break in the program in 2016, but it came back in 2017 and has been evolving since. Again, this year, we attempted three front lawn BBQs in conjunction with Advent Café. Unfortunately, rain derailed all our efforts to serve on the front lawn,

Our average cost was \$2.50 per meal, an increase from \$2.15 in 2023. It is because of the generous donations of food for our meals and planning of meals around food sales, that we were able to operate the program on what is today, a reasonable cost. Each month our parishioners donate fruit which is so enjoyed by our guests.

A team of volunteers is a joy to work with. We who serve are a community and we serve a community. We highly encourage anyone in our St George's community to join us for these dinners and to be part of how we create a warm and welcome space in our church around the gift of food.


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Advent Café, Annual Report 2024

I often say that although I am not a member of St. George's Church, I am a member of Advent Café. I am not an original member, but certainly one of the very early ones.

I have been part of the planning and execution of Advent Café for quite a few years, and I have seen interest and participation wax and wane over that time. It seemed we had a good thing going for a while, with a steady group of attendees, including many from the Out of the Cold program, and then, of course, Covid-19 caused a global shutdown of inperson gatherings, and Advent Café had to move to an entirely online event, with videos produced in our own homes, and after that, livestreamed from the Bear's Den with no audience in attendance. It never really recovered. When we were finally able to gather again in person, attendance was very poor. It seemed that perhaps Advent Café's time had come and gone. I think some of us (me included) were about ready to throw in the towel, but fortunately cooler heads prevailed, and instead of quitting we decided to revamp our offering.

Advent Café has always been about an alternative means of worship, and yes, it is worship, but not like Sunday morning. Advent Café is an offering for a different audience, a different congregation, St. George's or not, Anglican or not, and we don't want it to be just "one more church service to attend every week". With all this in mind, the Advent Café planning team (Martha, Tom, Brad, Greg, MJ, Allison, Gerald and myself, along with the input of a few others) decided on a new look for 2024.



We decided that Advent Café should be a monthly, rather than weekly, event. We decided to make it theme based. We decided to put the emphasis on the music, with narrative woven in between the songs to amplify the theme. Each month, we try to explore God's role in our modern world, and how we can live our lives mindful of our Christian faith, in today's social and economic climate. There is no longer an eucharist, no homily, nor anything

much resembling a traditional church service apart from some prayers near the end. We bracket the evening with song, opening and closing with music, to try and establish a true café atmosphere. Sometimes we highlight a particular songwriter (e.g. Taylor Swift, Billy Joel, the Staple Singers), not just with random songs, but always an underlying idea that brings all the music together and illustrates some point of learning. Sometimes we use songs from various sources to highlight a theme (e.g. Anne Boleyn and her role in the creation of the modern Anglican Church). We have welcomed a new band, Ambush, into the rotation of performers. We paid considerable attention to promoting Advent Café via social media as well as word of mouth, and we emphasized a welcoming atmosphere for the attendees. We flirted with a post-café discussion group, then abandoned the idea. We put our heart and soul into this endeavour. What was the result?



Online attendance jumped immediately. The Taylor Swift Advent Café, for instance, had over 150 views within a few days, and attracted attention across the Diocese of Niagara (and beyond). In-person attendance built a bit more slowly, but build it did, and the last Advent Café at which my band (Tracadie Cross) performed, the Anne Boleyn themed night,

had arguably the best in-person attendance in many years. Each group of performers

(Infinitely More, Tracadie Cross, Ambush, Brad Barnham) has developed its own following, but there is now once again a loyal group of attendees that come each month no matter who is performing. The technical aspects of the evening (sound, livestream, Powerpoint) are ably handled by Greg Maddison, MJ Schmidt, Lindsey Wilton and myself, with the occasional expert assistance of Shawn Clement. Music selection is done by the performers, and narratives are usually written by the performers with the assistance of Martha and Tom. A hospitality team ensures that coffee, drinks and finger foods are available and that a welcoming presence greets our attendees at the door.



It is clear to me that Advent Café is undergoing a resurgence, with strong leadership from Martha and Tom and the entire planning team, and I am excited to be part of it. The planning team is now turning its attention to better promoting what we are doing. It was pointed out to us that, while people may be aware that there is an Advent Café on a particular Wednesday, they often have no idea what that means, nor what really happens in the Bear's Den on those evenings. To that end, we are planning a "Mini Advent Café" after the Sunday morning worship on February 9, 2025, as a bit of a demonstration project to try and entice more people to come out and participate.

It's a time of renewed growth for Advent Café. Those of us involved in producing it intend to grow it even further in the 2025 church year. We would love to see you there!All of which is respectfully submitted.

Super Tuesday

Tuesday Evening has long been a "study time" for the people of St. George's. It was no different than usual in 2024. We had several diverse and well attended groups in the past year.

Martha led us in a multi week look at "Who was Mary Magdalene". We looked at questions being raised by current biblical scholars who were asking just who Mary Magdalene was. She is a rather

enigmatic figure who carries a lot of baggage through centuries of misunderstanding and misinterpretation. It was a very thought provoking look at this woman who could be described as the almost forgotten disciple. It became obvious to us that Mary Magdalene was one of the major followers of Jesus during his ministry on earth. For some of us it was a rather difficult study in trying to get our heads around so many new ideas. Whether we agreed or not with them all it was certainly thought provoking and we cannot look at Mary in the same way again.

We had two different groups going on concurrently in the winter and spring. Both Tom and Martha led us through a study of "<u>Christian Basics</u>". Rev. Tom led one group which was reflecting on Daily Prayer while Martha led discussions about Basic Christianity using some of the thought-provoking videos connected to the Alpha Program. Tom rejoined that group after his prayer group was finished with their study. It was a good introduction or reintroduction to the main points of the Christian Faith. The discussions were fruitful and helpful for many of us.

While the Christian Basics group were meeting in the Bear's Den, another group of us were in the Asbil Lounge with Mike Degan discussing Rowan Williams short book "Being Disciples". It was not an easy read, but it occasioned worthwhile wrestling with the ideas of the former Archbishop of Canterbury.

Later Alan McLean led a reading and discussion of a little book by William A. Berry SJ entitled "God and You: Prayer as Personal Relationship". It is a simple yet profound look at prayer, how we prayer, and being aware that prayer is based on acknowledging a relationship with God which develops and grows like any relationship. Many in the group found that it "demystified" and honoured the many ways we pray. God is there for us however we consciously do it. It was very reassuring for some of us, and a helpful reminder to all of us.

Finally, in the Fall of 2024 Tom led us through some of the videos from the series "The Chosen". Although we only did the first season of the videos it gave many of us a new and imaginative way to think about the story of Jesus and the people he encountered.

You can see that it was a busy and varied year in our learning together. We are fortunate to have such rich and varied learning opportunities at St. George's and I look forward to all we have to offer in 2025.

Daytime Bible Study

Our daytime Bible Study continued throughout 2024. We have a good group of around 12 – 14 people who read various books of the Bible together and discuss them. It does not presuppose any deep theological or Biblical knowledge, just a curiosity to read God's Word together and talk about what it might mean to us in our lives. During 2024 we read several books from the Old Testament Apocrypha, and we then moved to Genesis and then Exodus. It is a friendly and welcoming group, we often find ourselves talking about our faith without judgement in a spirit of support and friendship, often with much laughter. Everyone is welcome to attend. It is held at 10.30 AM on Wednesday morning. We would love to see you there.

Extramural Worship

Those of us who are able to attend regular worship at St. George's really appreciate the communal worship life that we experience there. Mike, M.J. Schmidt, Valear Howsam and Alan McLean.

I would also be remiss if I did not mention the videos of the 10 AM service which Janet Veale shows ton Tuesdays to her neighbours in Heatherwood. There is also an "in person" communion service at Heatherwood twice a year. I am grateful to be part of a parish that tries to respond to the faith needs of those who are unable to attend the church building in person.

Community Breakfast Program at St. George's Church

With the hard work of over 175 volunteers, breakfast was served with kindness every morning in 2024 to all who came, no questions asked. Thanks go to all who contributed and responded with generous donations of money, food and service.

In 2024, we served an average of 91 guests daily (a total of 33,379) up from a total of 31,340 guests in 2023. Our budget for 2024 was \$90,000 and we did exceed that number by about \$18,000, however as we received donations of over \$95,000 and had a surplus in 2023, the Program is in good financial shape. The Program is entirely funded by donations of money and food from many donors including many St George's parishioners who have continued to support the Program over the years. Continuing with the tradition, we have neither sought nor received any money from any level of government.

Major changes to The Operations Team occurred in 2024.

Marilyn and Sheldon Pettit retired from the Purchasing Team mid-year. We thank Marilyn and Sheldon for their many visits to Giant Tiger, picking up bread and rotating stock.

Alyssa and Donald Sewell and Nancy and Duncan Moffett joined the Purchasing Team.

Duncan Moffett retired as Program Chair after 5 years in the role and a total of over 12 years' service to the program. Duncan provided leadership during a time of change, COVID requiring a change to service at the door and then hybrid versions finally returning to in person dining. Duncan led with clear direction with no break in breakfast service.

Faye Perkins assumed the role of Treasurer, January 15th, joined by Dianne Chisholm. They managed the transition of the banking to Meridian Credit Union and installed QuickBooks to manage the finances. The banking transition has allowed the Program to receive and make payments through e-transfers, an especially important feature during the recent postal strike.

Kelly Bailey took on the Chair's role, effective January 1st. A Search Committee selected Kelly from 5 candidates. She brings a high energy level and a passion for our work.

Dawn Peters is now working with Nancy Moffett to take over the Volunteer Coordinator Role. Dawn is Team Leader on two teams and is a very energetic volunteer who is always willing to step in and help wherever needed.

Paul Chapman stepped down as Publicity and Fundraising Co-Coordinator. Paul led successful cereal drives over the years and was always able to get publicity for the program. His efforts are missed.

Duncan continued to lead short church services with one of the clergies monthly. Guests arrived early as we opened our doors for coffee and a snack at 7 AM. Guests sang and prayed with our leaders.

In 2024 we increased our monthly donation to St George's to \$1,000 (a 54 % increase). This is provided as our contribution towards the support we receive from the Church, particularly the janitorial services so cheerfully provided by Jordan McArthur and his assistant Dale.

We begin 2025 with new leadership and confidence. February marks the start of our 30th year of operation and we will be celebrating all our volunteers on February 17th at a Gratitude Breakfast Event. We are truly blessed.

Stewardship Committee

The annual Joyful Giving Campaign provided opportunities for parishioners to participate at meetings to hear about the wonderful work happening at St. George's and to share their comments. St. George's is blessed that we continue to draw new people to our parish. In this secular world, we thank God that St. George's continues to grow and flourish through the generosity of our committed church family.

Visitors Group

The visitor group works in conjunction with the clergy to ensure that all members of our parish who are unable to attend regularly scheduled worship services or request a visit, receive at their discretion, a personal visit at their residence or in hospital. Our goal is to share the spirit and fellowship that we all enjoy as members of the St. George's family. All visits are kept in confidence.

It is with deep regrets that we have had to say good-bye to a few of our long-time members of this year. They will be missed as members of our group and most of all by those they faithfully visited.

The clergy as well as two team members are designated hospital visitors. They minister to those in the St. Catharines General Hospital and the Hotel Dieu Shaver Health and Rehabilitation Centre. Visits usually last from a few minutes to an hour, depending upon the patients wishes. Members of our group also visit in the parishioner's homes or in the senior and long-term care facilities where they live.

The time and duration of these visits are at the convenience of the parishioner and visitor. The sacrament of Holy Communion is offered by the clergy or a member of the visitor team. Eucharist services are conducted at Linhaven, Ina Grafton and other facilities (upon request) during the year by clergy. Visitors must undergo a screening process and agree to abide by a rule of strict confidence regarding visits. Team meetings are held about five times per year or as circumstances dictate.

A visitor experiences the joy and fulfillment that comes from the expression of appreciation by the clergy and those we visit. Thank you, visitors, for sharing your talent and your unfailing dedication to this important ministry.

Prayer Chain Vestry Report For 2024-25

We are inspired in our prayer life by missives like an Evening Prayer composed by St. Augustine: "Watch, oh Lord with those who wake, or watch or weep tonight and give your angels and saints charge over those who sleep".

Our group keeps all prayer requests confidential. Information is only disseminated among the group. We try to individually pray daily and include the names of our petitioners in our prayers.

Those who would like our prayers may request help from us directly or through a person they have designated, such as a member of the clergy. Warden's Report

2024 has been a busy year for Wardens as we worked together with the Co-Rectors to meet the challenges of a very busy church in the downtown area of a city. The Wardens and Co-Rectors form the Corporation, an executive leadership group in the church. This group aids in the development of a budget, deals with personnel issues, manages church finances and assists in the running of the Sunday services. The Wardens in 2024 were Cheryl Bergie, Rector's Warden; Janet Veale, People's Warden; Tom Lewis, Deputy Rector's Warden; Jim Streadwick, Deputy People's Warden. The Co-Rectors were Rev. Martha Tatarnic and Rev. Tom Vaughan.

One of our first challenges was to accommodate The French Montessori School. They rented the "Lower Broughall" with occasional use of the gym and began classes in September.

In the fall there was a meeting of the generations as the youth of the congregation challenged the staff and interested parishioners in a basketball game. On two occasions the youth beat the older parishioners who were certainly not disgraced. More games are to follow.

The wonderful music program expanded this year with the formation of the "Little Dragons". Their first performance was at the 4:00 pm service on Christmas Eve. The choir under the direction of Brad Barnham continues to provide excellent music not only on Sundays but also at the Music Festival, The Requiem and the Lessons and Carols.

The ministries at St. George's continuing to reach out into the community of St. Catharines not only by serving breakfast every day of the year to anyone who comes but also through the Meal Bag Program and Community Dinners. People from the community join existing programs, Krafty Corners, K.E.G., Golf, B.A.C. and Bridge.

The most upsetting and saddest part of this past year was the sudden death of Tom Lewis, the deputy Rector's Warden in December. Tom was quietly present at all things whether it was church on Sunday, the Parish Council, Corporation, Committees or the basketball game Tom's presence was felt. He was well liked by all and there has been a deep sense of sadness and loss.

By the end of last year (2023) it was very apparent that St. George's needed to do a massive restoration of the church building. Monies are being donated to the Restoration Fund sometimes as a memorial gift and sometimes as people realize the positive effect St. George's has had on them and their families.
